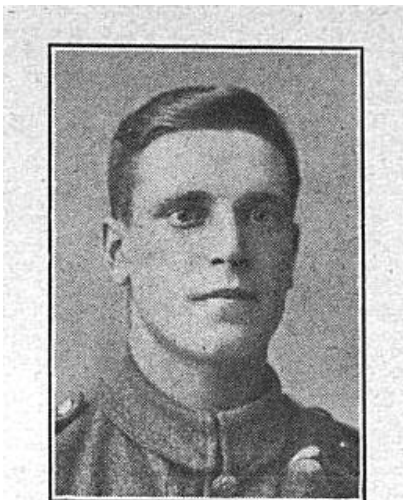

Trade on enlistment was a Porter. Son of William and A Abery of 54 De Beauvoir Road, Reading. Buried at Dozinghem Military Cemetery in Belgium, grave XV.E.12.






